Break-in at Beverly Beach Improvement Club (BBIC)

We received a note just this morning (February 28, 2025): "Someone Broke into the Well Pumphouse at Beverly Beach, just off East Harbor in Freeland and stole approximately \$10,000 worth of chemicals and some miscellaneous pump parts. We serve 130 Homes. They cut locks to our driveway gate and Pumphouse Door. If you see or hear anything in regard to this please call the Island County Sheriff."

Home Owner Association (HOA) Registrations

Once again a reminder to HOAs to keep your state registration up to date each year. All HOAs are required keep current registrations with the secretary of state to maintain their legal authority to manage their water systems. Scholarship/Apprenticeship Program

The shortage of trained technical professionals is having more of an impact every day. See a <u>recent</u> <u>Seattle Time article</u> to read about this national problem. To help with this locally, WIWSA has teamed with Evergreen Rural Water (ERWOW) to offer a scholarship to an applicant to Evergreen's one-year <u>QUEST</u> program or to the full two-year <u>Apprenticeship</u> program.

Through QUEST applicants will receive training for Level 1 certification in Water Treatment and Water Distribution Management and would be eligible to apply for the WIWSA scholarship. Local municipal and SMA employers are invited to sponsor applicants from their organizations, along with Group A water systems looking to certify back up operators. The full Apprenticeship program takes the applicant through to Level 2 certification and is intended for those working in the field to enable on-the-job apprenticeship as well as classroom time.

We are actively recruiting scholarship applicants for the 2025 Apprenticeship or QUEST program, and are looking for help with outreach to employers and educational programs to recruit potential applicants. If you're interested in this program please contact us by <u>email</u>.

 Chris Kelley spoke to the Board of Health including the three commissioners on the state of Water Availability in Island County. You can watch the video recording (about 20 minutes plus almost 45 minutes of discussion) here and can review his presentation here. The presentation includes an updated count of water systems in the county through 2024 (shown below), and at the end Shawn Morris offered a followup discussion at a later date addressing aquifer recharge and the monitoring wells program.

Department of Ecology

- Casey Sixkiller was appointed by Governor Bob Ferguson as the 14th Director of the Washington State Department of Ecology. Follow the links to read more about Casey here and Ecology's 2025-2030 strategic plan.
- By the end of the last Water Supply Availability Committee meeting on February 13, snow was falling!

- Bad Actors Spoofing SecureAccessWa (SAW)

Department of Health/Office of Drinking Water

- The next Quarterly Drinking Water Advisory Group (DWAG) meeting will be held on March 3, 2025. The meeting included updates on many topics including Lead and Copper Rule and information on Climate Resilience and Same Farm Policy. - The Washington State Board of Health (Board), working with the Department of Health, adopted an emergency update to chapter 246-290 WAC. This change ensures that federal maximum contaminant levels (MCLs) replace state action levels (SALs) when the MCLs are effective, not when they are adopted. This is necessary because the effective date for new federal MCLs is not until 2029, but the adoption date is June 25, 2024. The rule change ensures current protections for the public stay in place until the effective date. See the formal Press Release for all the details.
- DOH/ODW provides a deep library of documents, along with online tools and technical support to help you manage your water system. Check it out, especially if you're new to this world of water: Where to Find Drinking Water Information to see it all in one place.
